Alara Krahn (Mather, MB)

Alara Krahn grew up on a farm outside of Mather with approximately 2,300 acres devoted to grain. Her interest in farming sparked at a young age when she took up the responsibility of sweeping sheds and bins, cleaning cabs, painting equipment, picking rocks and other tasks. As Alara grew older, her responsibilities increased, and she learned how to operate a grain cart when she was 15 and drive a combine when she was 16. In the fall of 2024, she will begin her studies at the University of Manitoba to obtain a bachelor's degree in science (agriculture) in agronomy.
